

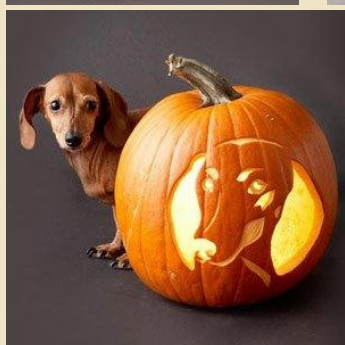
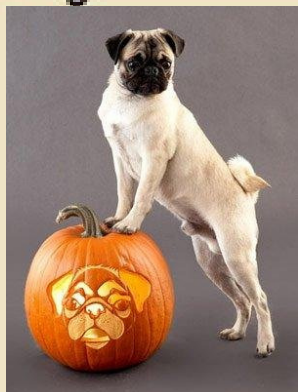

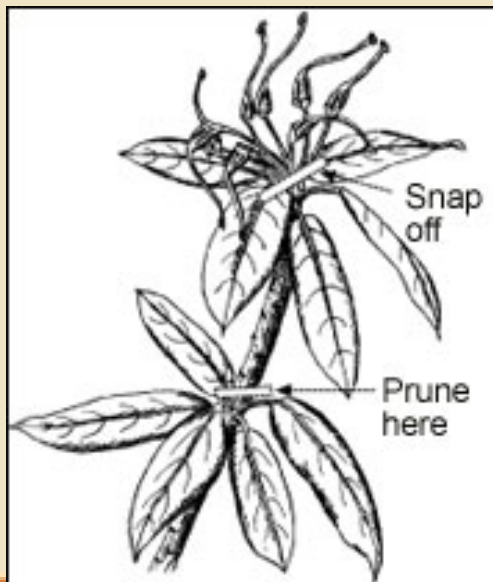

GARDEN TIPS 1 Pruning Broadleaf Evergreens

Broadleaf evergreens like hollies, Oregon grape and boxwoods are easy to prune because they rarely require more than removing the 'Four D's' of pruning (dead, diseased, damaged and deranged branches), have renewal buds under the bark (all along the stems) and tolerate pruning at almost any point. Pruning is best done just after flowering has finished. On the other hand, Rhododendrons have growth buds only at the base of the flower clusters and in the axils of the leaf whorls. If pruning is required, prune back to just above a whorl of leaves or just above a ring that indicates where a leaf whorl once was. Even old, overgrown rhododendrons can be rejuvenated by pruning back hard to just above a rung. New growth will develop from dormant buds hidden under the bark. To keep rhodos blooming well, it is good practice to remove the seed capsules that form as the blooms fade by snapping the cluster of capsules off as indicated in the diagram.



GARDEN TIP 2: Spray broadleaf evergreens with antidesiccant

A major problem with broadleaf evergreens is not lack of hardiness but poor placement in the landscape. On bright winter days, direct sunshine can thaw the foliage causing them to lose moisture. Because the roots are frozen, there is no way for that moisture to be replaced and the leaves 'winter-burn'. Winter-burned leaves do not recover and will remain unsightly until they are removed or drop off naturally. Planting broadleaf evergreens where they will not have to contend with winter sunshine will eliminate this problem. Spray broadleaf evergreens with an antidesiccant like Wiltpruf or Leaf Shield to protect them from excessive moisture loss this winter.
